


# **Revisioning the Terry B. Rogers College of Education and Social Sciences**

**Our Vision / Just Cause** 

As I continue to take you through the revisioning process the committee walked through, allow me to recap a bit. Our "Why" is posted at the top of the model (see the <u>Sept. newsletter</u>), our values serve as the foundation of the model (see the <u>Oct. newsletter</u>), and our beliefs (sometimes referred to as philosophy) are represented by pillars that connect core values to vision and mission (see the <u>Nov.</u> <u>newsletter</u>). With these components in place, we dove headstrong into developing and articulating our just cause, or vision.

As guided by Simon Sinek, we adopted his definitions of vision (something that is external to the organization) and just cause (a cause that is so just that we are willing to sacrifice for it).



Vision should describe the perfect world as we see it and a just cause should provide a lifetime of a cause worth working toward, else it lacks meaning.



To recap main points of the video, the essential features of a just cause that guided the committee's thinking and conversations were:

- 1. Inclusive anyone who wants to join the cause can. The very words used in a vision statement must be an invitation to those who believe what you believe, whether they are internal or external. They are an invitation to anyone who wants to contribute to what you believe.
- 2. Service Oriented must be for others, not for yourself. Includes a contributor and a benefactor. Service orientation means that the primary benefit goes to someone other than the contributor.
- 3. Idealistic state in terms that are literally unachievable.
- 4. Resilient different from being stable, resilience is the ability to adapt and change. Must be able to withstand cultural, political, or technological change. It must be durable.

Within these parameters, and with much thought and consideration, the committee articulated the following vision for our college:

We envision a safe and just world where hope is inspired, knowledge is valued, and communities welcome all perspectives and ideas with respect and kindness.



The Texas A&M University System Office of Academic Affairs supports a special partnership between the staff of the Public Policy Internship Program and the Bush School of Government and Public Service at Texas A&M University where undergraduate students from every university across the System can intern in Washington, D.C. for a semester while earning course credit.


The program will provide students with 6 hours of in-person coursework developed and taught by distinguished faculty from the Bush School of Government and Public Service, focusing on current issues and special topics relevant to Washington, D.C. and the American political system. **Students will attend classes two days a week** at the <u>Bush School DC Teaching Site</u>, located just blocks from the White House. Additionally, students will **intern three days a week in a hosting office** and earn between 0-6 hours of internship credit. Students will benefit from a curriculum that emphasizes critical thinking, policy analysis, and real-world application, equipping them with the skills and knowledge necessary for a successful career in public service.




# **Considerations When Applying for Grants**

When applying for external grants, please recognize that one or more institutional components will typically need to be consulted before the application is submitted. All external research grants should "flow" through SRS. Most non-research grants should "flow" through the Office of Philanthropy and External Relations. In most cases, grants that do not flow through SRS or Philanthropy are considered private enterprise and the awardee will not be allowed to use university resources while fulfilling work funded by the grant. Moreover, tax implications typically accompany direct payment to the awardee vs. funding the flow through the university processes. Employment of the university resources (aka offices) may result in larger awards than can be secured by individual faculty members.

While I acknowledge that there are smaller grant opportunities that do not lend themselves to the larger university processes, I strongly urge you to check before applying, regardless of the size of the grant. The resources are in place for your benefit and your success. Why not use them?


