We have several recruitment initiatives underway and are looking forward to welcoming an increased number of new students to our college in the upcoming academic year.

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Looking at Our Narrative



Early in the video, Simon Sinek says, "Good marketing talks about the buyer and bad marketing talks about the seller." If there is merit to this statement, then as we market what we sell, we should be appealing to the needs of our potential students and constituents instead of trying to showcase how good we are.


As I replayed the video several times, I thought about how our new BUFF START program (see pp. 10-11) came to life. A group of superintendents in the region

invited us (in this case, the Dept. of Ed. leadership) to the table, explained their staffing dilemma due to the nation- and state-wide teacher shortage, and requested that we create a high-quality, fast track to enable a particular subset of paraprofessionals to earn their B.S. degree and become certified teachers. Note that we did not invite our constituents to the table; they invited us. The conversation was focused 100% on their needs, not ours. Yes, we need enrollment, but as I shared with both our provost and president, increased enrollment was not the motivation behind the creation of BUFF START. The motivation behind its creation was to serve a need conveyed to us by external constituents in our region and I anticipate increased enrollment to come as a by-product.

As you reflect on the video, and perhaps on the BUFF START story I just shared, I pose the following question to you as trusted colleagues. In recognition of our college's need to grow enrollment, should we change our sign, our narrative, or both?


2015-2020 All Degree Types (Bachelor & Master)

Department of Psychology, Sociology, and Social Work



Department of Political Science and Criminal Justice



The 2024 summit is scheduled for March 6 and 7 in Harrington Academic Hall WTAMU Amarillo Center, 720 S. Tyler St.



New Embedded Associate Degrees



West Texas A&M University students soon can earn an associate degree enroute to completing their bachelor's degree, thanks to a new plan approved by The Texas A&M University System Board of Regents that will help combat student indebtedness.

Students who reach 60 semester credit hours — 42 hours of core curriculum courses and 18 hours aligned with their major, will automatically receive associate degrees beginning in fall 2024.

This unique offering is expected to aid in student recruitment and retention. Embedded associate degrees are not meant to compete with community colleges. The ultimate goal is to encourage students to complete their bachelor's degrees, but to provide our students with recognition of a milestone while keeping their indebtedness as low as possible.

Our college will have associate degrees in education and social sciences.

BUFF START

WEST TEXAS A&M UNIVERSITY (WTAMU)

- All transcript hours with a "C" or better from an accredited College or University can transfer with no age limitations.
- 84 out of 120 credit hours can come from outside WTAMU. WTAMU graduates must take their last 36 of advanced hours through WTAMU.
- WTAMU will try to incorporate district PD expectations as part of the required assignments in the 9 credit hours earned through WTAMU's Education on Demand (EOD) self-paced courses.
- Paraprofessionals work responsibilities can be counted as clinical teaching experience in Texas [TAC 228.35]. 490 hours through a minimum of 28 weeks. No need for the additional cost and time of an Alternative Certification.
- District has the flexibility to fund all costs to candidates through the "WTAMU Sponsored Billing" process.
- Around \$18,500 for 60 hours. (Financial aid may be available to candidates through the FAFSA/PELL Grants, and opportunities to be awarded WTAMU university/department scholarships).
- Time to completion for B.S. Ed. Degree from WTAMU and Texas Teacher Certification = 14 months (May July of the following year).

Submit Nominations – The Silver Buffalo Award

The Silver Buffalo Award recognizes students whose efforts and talents distinguish themselves, their organizations, and the University with excellence in a national arena per academic year. The timeframe for nominations is annual (for example February 2023 through February 2024), to catch all national recognition accomplishments for the recognition at the All-University Honors event on Friday, April 19th 2024.

Nomination process:

Political Activities, Conflicts of Interest

As we progress through the current election year, please refresh your understanding of The Texas A&M University System Policy 07.03 regarding employee ethics and political activities.

1. Endorsement of Candidates and Office Holders


West Texas A&M University may not endorse, recommend, or otherwise indicate political support for any candidate for an elected office, or for any current officeholder of such an office.

2. Discrimination Based on Political Viewpoint

West Texas A&M University will not discriminate against any organization or individual on the basis of political affiliation or doctrine, nor will it favor any political organization or doctrine over another.

3. Political Campaign Events in WTAMU Facilities

Political Campaign Meetings or Speeches. Student organizations that are officially chartered and currently registered with the WTAMU Student Organizations Office, and faculty or staff groups that are recognized by WTAMU and which meet on campus, may sponsor partisan political activities or events on campus. Only organizations of students, faculty or staff that have been recognized and approved may sponsor partisan political activities or events on campus and may use WTAMU symbols, insignia or other identifiable WTAMU mark, in accordance with this rule.



4. Current Officeholders

When a holder of a political office visits West Texas A&M University, the officeholder shall be afforded all due respect and courtesies to which the officeholder is entitled. However, the officeholders may not engage in any partisan political activities, including campaigning for themselves or on behalf of others, unless they comply with the preceding sections of this rule. If the nature of an officeholder's visit is not clear prior to arrival, University officials should use their best efforts to determine in advance if the officeholder will be engaging in any partisan activities during the visit.

5. Use of WTAMU or TAMUS Symbols, Insignia, and Other Identifying Marks

Subject to Section 3, the use of any symbol, insignia, or other identifiable mark of West Texas A&M University or The Texas A&M University System in association with any partisan political activity, including campaigns by political candidates, is prohibited.

Technology Updates

Duo Verified Push

This is a new standard of cyber protection that is being quickly adopted by other universities. IT has already implemented this in areas that contain confidential and sensitive information, and will be implementing this campus-wide. It requires a 6-digit code that ensures authentication can only be completed with direct access to both the device accessing the web resource and the associated mobile device.

Data Classification Standard

This is a new requirement the legislature created aimed at protecting confidential information across the state. With the adoption of the cloud and a modern-day digital workforce, the university has data everywhere. Matt Lauterbach is our lead on this and will work with us to classify and protect university data.

Prohibited Technology Plan

This is being driven by our state government and includes a growing list of hardware and software that are banned from our computer networks. This has become synonymous with TikTok, but it's broader than that.

- If it's a university-owned computer or network, we are required to prevent access and block it through technology controls.
- If it's a personal device, we are to prohibit the technology on devices that conduct state business, like access to email.
- We are required to identify, catalog, and label locations that discuss confidential or sensitive information. The Board of Regents room is a good example. This also includes virtual meeting locations like Microsoft Teams and Zoom. This will most likely impact our E-Sports program, which runs popular online games from Tencent. The system office is looking at this issue right now, with more guidance forthcoming.

AI Guidelines From TAMUS

TAMUS is recommending that AI services that have not been inventoried and/or approved by each member institution be blocked by technology controls. Our first step in compliance with this guidance is to work with this council and identify any AI software-as-a-service that may be in use in our respective areas and then formulate a plan together to work in the spirit of the system's cybersecurity standards related to AI.

Colleague Financial Systems IT Audit

TAMUS Internal Audit is conducting an audit of the internal technology and security controls over our financial systems. The audit has started and will run through June with a final report being presented to the board, likely in August.

WT Alumni Scholars Program

WT Alumni have the opportunity to nominate high school students for free admission into WT. If you are interested in nominating high school students for our WT Alumni Scholars program, click here for the submission form.

While exceptions within reasonable bounds can be made, the expectation is nominees will meet the following general requirements:

- 1. Meet Texas Uniform Admission Policy
- 2. Top 25% no minimum ACT/SAT score, 26-50% 18 ACT or 960 SAT, 51-75% 21 ACT or 1060 SAT, 76-100% 23 ACT or 1130 SAT
- 3. 2.0 GPA



For the Fall of 2024 class, you are encouraged to submit your list as soon as possible and no later than May 1, 2024.

Procedural Updates

PAST, CURRENT, AND FUTURE FACULTY AWARDS

Faculty awards with monetary stipends received from the Terry B. Rogers
College of Education and Social
Sciences will have a one-year time
limitation for expending funds moving
forward. The one-year time clock will
begin on or about the date of the
announcement of the award.
Accordingly, for the teaching, research,
and service awards that will be
announced in late April / early May
2024, the time to expend said funds will
extend from May 1, 2024 to April 30,
2025.

This new procedure will apply to all monetary awards received from the college this academic year. The new time limitation is applicable only to college-level awards. Faculty who have unspent award funds from previous years are encouraged to request and expend those funds by April 30, 2025.





Procedural Updates

CBA CARD USAGE

Business expenses charged to personal credit cards will not be reimbursed except in the most extreme of extenuating circumstances (broadly defined as beyond your control). The CBA card must be used as instructed in the applicable guides accessible from the College Travel Information webpage.

GENERAL TRAVEL

All travel-related reservations must be in the WT Faculty or Staff member's name, otherwise the cardholder whose name the reservation was made will be responsible for the charge.

HOTEL V. AIRBNB

In the absence of a justified business need, Airbnb lodging is prohibited. If a legitimate business need exists, written justification must be submitted via email to travel@wtamu.edu and approved before reservations may be made.

PERSONAL VEHICLE MILEAGE REIMBURSEMENT V. RENTAL VEHICLE

If you drive your personal vehicle to your destination, you will be reimbursed the lesser of the actual mileage or the cost to rent a vehicle using the Rental Vehicle vs. Mileage Reimbursement Calculator, which is available on the intranet travel webpage. When renting a vehicle, a completed Motor Vehicle Rental Tax Exemption Certificate must be provided to the vendor. It is available on the intranet travel webpage.

TrainTraq Compliance

As a friendly reminder to all full- and part-time faculty and staff, including student workers, the following penalties will be assessed for being 20 days delinquent in any assigned training:

- 1. Graduate Assistants, Student Workers, and Staff Technicians will have their employment terminated by their department. They are eligible for rehire if the manager chooses to rehire them. The department will be responsible for the cost of a new criminal history check.
- 1. Faculty and Staff employees will have their network access removed until their past-due training is completed. Also, Faculty and Staff employees who are delinquent in their training at any time during the fiscal year will not be eligible for any merit increases.
- 2. Any part-time employee, including part-time instructors (PTIs) who are in training non-compliance, may not be eligible for rehire in the future.
